


INTERNATIONAL STUDENT FACT SHEET 5:

Paying for healthcare in Australia

Navigating your way around the Australian healthcare system can be a quite confusing at times. Here is some useful information about your private health insurance (OSHC) and finding out more abouts costs to access health services.



Healthcare in Australia

Australians can access healthcare through either the public or the private system.

The **public health system** is accessed through <u>Medicare</u> - services that are fully covered by the public system are "bulk billing". Medicare is usually only available to Australian citizens, permanent residents and migrants from a few listed countries.

The **private health system** can be accessed by anyone, though there may be larger costs involved without <u>private insurance</u>. Services that are fully covered by a private health insurance policy are "direct billed."

For most international students, you will be accessing sexual and reproductive healthcare through the private system.

What is OSHC?

If you are an international student studying in Victoria, you probably have **Overseas Student Health Cover (OSHC)**.

OSHC is **private insurance** to help you cover the costs of medical treatment, hospital care, and some prescription medications you may need while in Australia. This insurance might be provided through somewhere like BUPA, Medibank, Australian Health Management, NIB or Allianz.

Each OSHC provider will have a variety of plans available, so contact your provider to check you are covered for what you might need. You should ask them about **waiting periods**, **exclusions and other limitations** on your plan – for example, many plans do not cover pregnancy-related care in your first 12 months in Australia.

OSHC providers may also have a list of "preferred" health providers who they accept direct billing from. You can get the contact details of these services from their websites.

If you're from a country with a <u>Reciprocal</u> <u>Health Care Agreement (RHCA)</u> you might receive some Medicare benefits, also known as **Reciprocal Medicare**.

If you don't have health cover in Australia, medical services can be very expensive.

Paying for treatment and medication

When you need medical treatment, there are two options for payment:

- Pay the healthcare provider (eg. doctor clinic) directly, then get **refunded** by your OSHC insurer
- "Direct billing" where the clinic will send your bill directly to your OSHC insurer. This can reduce any payment you might need to make on the day of the appointment. Check with individual clinics if they have an agreement with your private insurance provider, to do "direct billing".

Depending on your insurance plan, you may still need to pay an extra amount for some services – this is called an "out-of-pocket" cost, or a "gap fee".

If you are buying prescription medication, you will first need to pay the pharmacy directly before making a claim to your insurer.

How much will a service cost?

The cost of accessing sexual and reproductive health services will **depend** on your private health insurance cover, where you go and how healthcare providers bill their services.

When trying to figure out how much a service might cost, or how much your insurance provider will cover, you will need to provide the insurance company with the **Medicare Item Number** for the medical procedure.
